Dear families,

We celebrated the feast of Pentecost on Sunday which is one of the most significant feasts in the Church calendar. Known as the birthday of the Church it recognises the calling of the disciples to go out and spread the good news.

We may want to live a life where we practice universal acceptance for all with a preferential option for those most in need, but somehow life seems to get in the way. One thing that I keep reminding myself though, is that Jesus also preached of a forgiving God. With that in mind, I'll keep doing my best and seek forgiveness when I need to.

Religious Education News

THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday May 19, 2024 Pentecost Sunday (Year B) Gospel: John 20:19-23

The disciples were afraid of the Jewish leaders, and on the evening of that same Sunday they locked themselves in a room. Suddenly, Jesus appeared in the middle of the group. He greeted them and showed them his hands and his side. When the disciples saw the Lord, they became very happy.

After Jesus had greeted them again, he said, "I am sending you, just as the Father has sent me." Then he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone's sins, they will be forgiven. But if you don't forgive their sins, they will not be forgiven." (Gospel passage taken from Contemporary English Version)

Gospel reflection: The disciples were scared of people they thought would hurt them and so they were hiding away. When Jesus came, they rejoiced, and he gave them a very special gift, the gift of the Holy Spirit.

We cannot see the Holy Spirit, like we can see each other. The Holy Spirit is like the wind. We cannot see the wind, but we can certainly feel it on a windy day. We can see the leaves moving in the trees because of the wind, or a kite flying high in the sky. The wind can be very strong and powerful.

Just like the wind, we can see the effects of the Holy Spirit. Can you think of how we might see the Holy Spirit moving in our world?

The Holy Spirit can work through us when we are kind to our family and friends, when we think about other people around the world, and when we work together with people who need our help. The Holy Spirit can also give us courage to speak out, just like the disciples in today's readings. Can you think of a time when it might be difficult to say what you really think?

We can see that the world is not a very fair place. Many children do not have enough food to eat or clean water to drink. What do you think you could do about that?

Formal Reports

Teachers are in the process of gathering and updating data to assist with writing their Semester One reports. Research shows that children are more likely to perform better when school and families work together. Our formal reports are another opportunity for us to foster our school-home partnership with you. You will receive a formal written report for your child/ren on Thursday 30th June via the Parent Access Module (PAM). This

report will provide feedback about your child's progress and achievement in accordance with the Victorian Curriculum.

The Semester One Formal Reports will include:

- 1. A Religious Education comment detailing your child's Semester One learning outcomes and opportunities in alignment with our Awakenings Core Document.
- 2. A personalised written comment to celebrate your child's achievements, particularly in relation to their Personal and Social Learning.
- 3. A personalised comment to identify your child's Next Steps in Learning to ensure future success and growth.
- 4. Level of attainment in the form of a dot on a continuum for the learning areas explicitly taught in Semester One and in accordance with the Victorian Curriculum Achievement Standards:
 - \cdot English (Reading & Viewing, Writing, Speaking & Listening)
 - · Mathematics (Number & Algebra, Measurement & Geometry, Statistics & Probability)
 - · Visual Arts
 - · Performing Arts
 - · Health and Physical Education
 - · Science Environmental Education
 - Technologies
 - · Humanities- History
 - · Capabilities = Ethical (3&5), Personal and Social (F-6) Critical and Creative Thinking (2-6) and Intercultural (4&6))

A Message of Peace

Pentecost Sunday: John 15:26-27; 16:12-15

Pentecost Sunday is often called the birthday of the Church.

For the ancient Israelites, Pentecost (meaning "fiftieth") was a harvest festival celebrated 50 days after the beginning of the harvest.

When the Jerusalem Temple was built, this harvest festival was transformed into a pilgrimage feast to celebrate the covenant that God had made with Israel on Mt Sinai.

In the decades following the death of Jesus, the early Christians reflected on their origins and chose this feast to mark the birth of God's new covenant with God's people.

In today's first reading, Luke tells the new Pentecost story in symbolic language that evokes the story of Moses and the people of Israel receiving God's Law on Mt Sinai.

Just as God's presence to Israel was marked by earthquake and thunder and fire, so God's Spirit enveloping the people of the new covenant appears in a mighty rush of wind and tongues of fire.

Luke's account also evokes early rabbinic teaching that the voice of God on Sinai divided into seventy tongues and all the nations received the Law in their own tongue. For the teaching at the heart of the new covenant, we turn to the gospel reading from John where Jesus speaks of the Spirit as both Advocate and Spirit of Truth who is "sent" by Jesus and comes forth from the "Father". The Spirit will testify on Jesus' behalf.

We too are called to listen

While this passage from John becomes central to later discussions about the nature of the Trinity and the fourth-century formulation of the creeds, the focus of Jesus' words in the context of John's gospel is on the disciples and their way of being in the world.

The message of the Johannine Jesus is that "you too will testify/bear witness."

Jesus is speaking to disciples who have been with him "from the beginning". They are those who know what it means to abide, to "hang in there" through the challenging as well as the good times. They have listened and learned and so have the capacity to testify or bear witness.

The expression "Spirit of truth" has a particular resonance in the present



climate of "fake news/fake wisdom" and "spin" or distortion of truth, in what Australian social psychologist Hugh Mackay dubs the "Age of Opinion."

The Spirit of truth will guide the first disciples "into all the truth." The Spirit of truth will continue to guide disciples throughout the ages into a deep understanding of truth.

This is the message of the Johannine Jesus for us in our times as much as it was for disciples in the first century of the common era.

We too are called to listen, to learn and to remain constant in our commitment to the truth.

We know that we are never alone, that the Spirit of truth is the source of our power to testify to the truth.

As we pray "Come Holy Spirit" this Pentecost, let us renew our commitment to the pursuit of truth.
