THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday June 23, 2024 Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B)

Gospel: Mark 4:35-41

On the evening of that same day Jesus said to his disciples, "Let us go across to the other side of the lake." So they left the crowd; the disciples got into the boat in which Jesus was already sitting, and they took him with them. Other boats were there too. Suddenly a strong wind blew up, and the waves began to spill over into the boat, so that it was about to fill with water. Jesus was in the back of the boat, sleeping with his head on a pillow. The disciples woke him up and said, "Teacher, don't you care that we are about to die?"

Jesus stood up and commanded the wind, "Be quiet!" and he said to the waves, "Be still!" The wind died down and there was a great calm. Then Jesus said to his disciples, "Why are you frightened? Have you still no faith?"

But they were terribly afraid and said to one another, "Who is this man? Even the wind and the waves obey him!" (Gospel passage taken from Good News Translation)

Gospel reflection:

Sometimes when everything around us is scary and going wrong, it can be hard to keep our faith in God. We can feel like God is no longer with us and it is hard to see how things will get better. In this reading Jesus tells the disciples not to be afraid. God is always with them, especially in difficult times.

God works through us and through others who are there to help and support us in difficult times. The next time that we are sad, or afraid, let us remember that we are never alone. God is always with us. Let's try to see God in those who make us laugh and be happy, or who help us when we are frightened – our friends, our family, our teachers.

Our Challenge: Let's try to be there for other people when they are facing difficult times, so that they know that God is still with them too. (Adapted from CAFOD website)

Child Safe Standard 2: Child safety and wellbeing is embedded in organisational leadership, governance and culture.

I was thinking recently about chatting with a trusted colleague of mine when I was a First Year teacher. I was feeling overwhelmed by my class's behaviour and they replied to me saying "I know! They really are acting like six and seven year olds today."

This conversation, at the beginning, made me feel better with a laugh but then it helped me change my thinking. When we take time to comprehend our students' views, problem solving gets easier.

Sometimes we may forget that children wear 'L' plates while they are learning how to "do" life. It takes many children at least five years before they can have a go at tying their own shoelaces so of course it's going to take them time to figure out how to regulate their emotions.

Some adults still struggle with this! We need to be calm while they evolve.

Attached is a link to the St. Francis Xavier <u>SchoolTV website</u>. I have recently come across an article on the website written by Rebecca Eanes from the Creative Child website. Rebecca is a bestselling author and the founder of positive-parents.org. In this article Rebecca defines behaviour as 'teachable moments' - I suggest you jump on and have a read!

It's ok to let our kids see our humaness. In fact, I think it's

neccessary.

They should see what it looks like to mess up, apologise and figure out how to make it right. None of us walk through this life perfectly and the real lesson is showing our kids what to do next after the mistake.

SPIRITUAL HERITAGE PILGRIMAGE TO IRELAND

On Sunday, Fr Justin will lead 16 DOBCEL (Diocese of Ballarat Catholic Education Limited) Principals and Leaders from across the Diocese to Dublin to commence a 15 day spiritual heritage pilgrimage. The pilgrimage, part of the 150th anniversary of the Diocese of Ballarat, provides an opportunity for the leaders to recognise, celebrate and understand more deeply the profound influence of the Irish on the Australian Catholic Church. "By 1871 the population of Victoria had reached 700,000, of whom 170,000 were Catholics. 100,000 of them had migrated from Ireland in the 2 decades following the discovery of gold." (Jill Blee, From the Murray to the Sea). It was to Ireland that the Church in Australia turned to staff its Catholic schools when state aid was withdrawn in 1872. Of the 63 Catholic Primary and Secondary schools in the Diocese, 49 schools have a heritage linked to these religious congregations that came to the Diocese from Ireland to staff our Catholic schools. The charisms of these religious congregations have formed the foundations of the distinctively Catholic education that we have today.

Our hope is grounded in God who moves us to action

Gospel reflection by Veronica Lawson RSM Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Mark 4:35-41

oday's gospel story looks back to the parables of Mark 4:1-34 and to the crowds that heard them. The story also looks forward as it marks the beginning of the second major section of Mark's gospel (4:35-8:21), a section that seems to be structured around a number of crossings of the lake or Sea of Galilee. Jesus' decision to move with his disciples out of familiar territory is deliberate: "Let us go across to the other side." The crossing itself is difficult, as is the challenge that confronts them on the other side of the lake. From the disciples' perspective, the seeming indifference of the sleeping Jesus is even more disturbing than the storm that threatens their safe crossing: "Do you not care that we are perishing?" Jesus demonstrates that he does indeed care. From his perspective, the problem is with the fear in their hearts, a fear that is grounded in their lack of faith: "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?" In the context of this Markan story. Jesus is like the sower in the parable (4:27-28) who goes to sleep and trusts that the seed will sprout and grow and

bear fruit-which it does. Within a first-century Jewish context, Jesus' ability to "rebuke" the storm is a sign of divine power. In the Psalms, for instance, the God of Israel is the one who stills the roaring of the seas (Psalm 65:5) and controls the creatures that inhabit the waters (Psalm 89:9). Today's first reading has insisted that God commands the sea and all of its moods.

In the Book of Job, God the Birthing Mother presents Job with a series of rhetorical questions, reminding him and us that, while the sea may be threatening, it is God's new born infant, wrapped in God's swaddling clothes of darkness and cloud (Job 38).

We read Mark's little story against the backdrop of the Hebrew Scriptures. We might also read it in light of contemporary science and find within

it a call to consider how our species respects or fails to respect and to nurture the fruit of God's womb, the cosmos. The story of the storm at sea is most certainly not an invitation to be complacent about the extreme weather events on our planet, trusting in God that all will be well. While such terrifying events can derive from the movement of tectonic plates over which we have no control, they can also derive from or be exacerbated by excessive carbon and methane emissions. We pollute the atmosphere and make the seas to rise at our peril. Trust in God may involve relinquishing vested interests and engaging the processes that are designed to reverse the effects of the human-induced climate catastrophe. As nations begin to embrace more ambitious climate action, we have some reason to hope. Our hope is grounded in God who moves us to action.
