Cover-Up Clothing

Traffic around our school

It is vitally important that all adults observe the safety rules when approaching our school at drop off and pick up times. Doing so risks the safety of other children and drivers. At pick up and drop off times most traffic on Fortune Street is directly connected to our school community so it is very important that we look out for each other and model safe practices at all times.

THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL- Sunday June 9, 2024 Tenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B)

Gospel: Mark 3:20-35

Jesus went home. Again such a large crowd gathered that Jesus and his disciples had no time to eat. When his family heard about it, they set out to take charge of him, because people were saying, "He's gone mad!"

Then Jesus' mother and brothers arrived. They stood outside the house and sent in a message, asking for him. A crowd was sitting round Jesus, and they said to him, "Look, your mother and your brothers and sisters are outside, and they want you."

Jesus answered, "Who is my mother? Who are my brothers?" He looked at the people sitting round him and said, "Look! Here are my mother and my brothers! Whoever does what God wants him to do is my brother, my sister, my mother."

(Gospel passage taken from Good News Translation)

Gospel reflection: In today's gospel, some people challenge Jesus about his ministry. Jesus compares the people around him to his own family. Jesus says that whoever does what God wants them to do is a part of his family. We are all brothers and sisters with Christ.

When we see that there are people who need help across the world, this gospel reminds us that they are family too- that means we should do our best to listen to them and to help them in difficult times. We can care for others, even if they live far away, just the same as if they were members of our own family, as if they are our brothers and sisters.

Our Challenge: How will you show that you care for your brothers and sisters around the world this week?



Sacrament of First Eucharist:

This week we pray for many of our Year Four Students who are receiving the Sacrament of First Eucharist over the following two weekends.

As a part of their Religious Education lessons, the children have been invited to think about hospitality and how Catholic Christians celebrate at Mass. RE: STRUCTURED LITERACY PARENT INFORMATION SESSIONS

Dear Families,

At St Francis Xavier Primary School, we are very excited to partner with our neighbouring Diocese Of Ballarat Catholic Education Limited (DOBCEL) primary schools and La Trobe University as part of the Structured Literacy Project.

Structured Literacy is an approach to literacy instruction that applies a systematic, cumulative, explicit and diagnostic methodology to the teaching of phonology, orthography, morphology and etymology, syntax and semantics.

It is heartening and inspiring to see the huge groundswell of change happening in schools, sectors, and systems around the country. In response to the Grattan Institute Report, "The Reading Guarantee", now more than ever educators are accessing high-quality, independent research and evidence. Perhaps more importantly, they also have the wisdom to interpret research with discernment and informed judgement. I'm reminded of a quote by Dr Reid Lyon:

"When you're working on something that's so crucial to a life - a child's life - belief systems don't cut it. Evidence cuts it."

As with any transitional period of growth, this adaptation towards a more evidence-informed philosophy of teaching is a gradual and ongoing journey. I am very proud of our teaching staff who have taken on the significant workload that comes with such change with enthusiasm and bravery. As a teaching team, we continue to be on the journey of implementing and adjusting our classroom instruction to provide the most effective and efficient opportunities for your children.

The partnership between school and home certainly cannot be underestimated. Given this, I would like to warmly extend the invitation to all adult family members to attend an information session detailing the changes we are making and our rationale behind these. These sessions will take place in our school Gymnasium. There are two session times for you to choose from. The presentation will be the same at both sessions.

First Aid News

Anaphylaxis Awareness:

St Francis Xavier Primary School is concerned about the safety and well-being of all of our students. Many of you will know someone who is affected by anaphylaxis, a life-threatening allergic reaction.

Our school does its best to be an allergy aware school. Staff have had training in severe allergy management and we have implemented lots of strategies to help keep students at risk of anaphylaxis as safe as we can. We have 2 students who live with the risk of anaphylaxis to nuts. Whilst plans are in place to care for these students we ask that you help us educate your child on the importance of not sharing food with others, washing hands after eating and calling out to an adult if they think their friend with allergies is sick.

With increased awareness and understanding of anaphylaxis, we will be able to help protect those around us.

As the only way to manage a food allergy is avoidance, the school has implemented many strategies to help prevent a severe allergic reaction. We can never totally eliminate the risk of an anaphylaxis but we can all do things that will help lessen the risk. Please consider the child with food allergy when packing your child's lunch or when sending in food for any occasion, including school excursions. Foods that 'May contain traces of nuts' are fine for the non-allergic students to consume at school as long as they do not share food.



CLERGY APPOINTMENTS

Fr Gary Jones has retired as Parish Priest of Our Lady of Mercy Parish Hampden (Mortlake and Terang) and from 1 July, he will join the ranks of the senior clergy, residing in Ballarat. Fr Neville Stanislaus has been appointed Parish Administrator of Hampden Parish, in addition to his responsibilities as Parish Priest of Camperdown and Timboon. Fr Jim McKay has been appointed Visiting Priest for the Hampden Parish, while Fr Abraham Thomas MST will move from being Assistant Priest in the Southwest Coast Parish (Warrnambool etc) to Assistant Priest in the Cathedral Parish. Whoever Does the Will of God

Gospel reflection by Veronica Lawson RSM

Tenth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Mark 3:20-35

Name-calling is an age-old device used to discredit enemies. Politicians are adept at finding labels with which to discredit their opponents. Sometimes the labels stick and often have the effect of destroying good people.

In today's gospel, Jesus is subjected to the worst of all imaginable taunts or labels: he is said to be possessed by Beelzebub, the prince of demons. The story belongs within a trajectory of growing hostility towards him from the authorities.

Mark has presented Jesus as the Christ or Messiah, as God's Son who is authorised to usher in God's empire of reconciliation and peace. Jesus is the "stronger one" (1:7) who will destroy the powers of evil. He invites others to join him in his mission of healing, of proclaiming God's reign and of driving out demons.

Those on the edge of Palestinian society flock to him for healing. The religious authorities, on the other hand, find themselves challenged, even threatened, by Jesus' growing popularity and his perceived challenge to their strict interpretation of aspects of the Mosaic Law.

Such practices as dining with those considered to be "sinners" and permitting his hungry disciples to pluck grain on the Sabbath, for instance, are met with hostile responses from the religious authorities.

For Jesus, always the faithful Jew, the Law was established for humans, not humans for the Law and he is not afraid to say so.

Early in his ministry, opposition has built to a point that traditional enemies, the Pharisees and the Herodians, join forces to find a way of destroying him.

Mark often places a story within a story

The surprise is that members of Jesus' biological family now get involved in the attempts to put a halt to his mission, even if their motives differ from those of the Jerusalem "scribes" who bring the charge of demon possession.

One factor to consider is that the family's honour is at stake. Another factor is the family's concern that Jesus and his disciples were failing to take care of themselves. The demands were such that "they could not even eat".

Even if well-motivated, they want "to seize him" because they consider him



to be "out of his mind." Jesus' biological family thus falls into the trap of taking responsibility for him instead of supporting him to pursue his dream.

Mark often places a story within a story. In this instance, the story within is the challenge from the scribes and of Jesus' powerful counterchallenge.

The outer frame consists of the efforts of Jesus' biological family to save their honour by saving him from a crazy lifestyle and by his redefining of his "family" as those "who do the will of God".

This complex story invites us to refrain from labelling those who threaten our status or authority. They may just happen to be agents of God's transforming grace for us and for our world.
